Grade Level: 2nd Grade **Video Title:** *How Full Is It?*

Media Literacy Focus: Thinking before liking, commenting, or sharing — Is it helpful,

hurtful, or truthful?

Essential Question

How can asking "How Full Is It?" help us make smart choices online?

Learning Targets

Students will be able to:
Ask questions about online messages and images
Decide if a post is helpful, hurtful, or truthful
Recognize when not to comment or share
Practice being kind and responsible online
Understand that their online actions can affect others

Vocabulary

- Helpful Something that makes someone's day better
- Hurtful Something that can hurt someone's feelings
- Truthful Something that is honest and supported by facts
- Post A message, photo, or video shared online
- Media Master A person who makes kind, safe choices online

Whole Group Discussion

Lead students with these questions:

- What does it mean to be a Media Master?
- Can words or pictures online hurt someone?
- Why is it important to ask, "How full is it?" before we share something?

What should you do if you see a hurtful post?

Activity Ideas

1. "How Full Is It?" Traffic Light Sort

Create red (hurtful), yellow (not sure/missing truth), and green (helpful) cards. Read or show short "post" examples and have students sort them using traffic light signals:

- = Don't share
- = Think first
- = Okay to share

Example:

- "Your art is amazing!" →
- "That kid is so dumb." →
- "Aliens live under the school!" →

2. "Be a Media Master!" Mini Poster

Students create a mini-poster with the three big questions:

- Is it **Helpful**?
- Is it **Hurtful**?
- Is it Truthful?

Decorate with examples of good online choices.

3. Media Master Circle Time

Use puppets or role-play to show a post. Students take turns explaining if it's helpful, hurtful, or truthful, and what a Media Master would do.

Writing Prompt

Prompt:

Write about a time you saw or heard something that wasn't nice. What could a Media Master do in that situation?

Students should write 2–3 sentences and draw a picture.

Extension: Class Pledge

As a class, create a "Media Master Pledge." Example:

"I promise to stop and think before I click. I will be kind and tell the truth. I will not share things that hurt others."

Display it in the room.

Final Reflection Question

How can we help others by being careful about what we post and share online?
