# **Third Grade ELA Study Guide**

Video Title: The Rubber Band Rule

**Theme:** Think before you post — online actions have consequences

**Grade Level:** 3rd Grade

Time Needed: ~45–60 minutes

**Goal:** Students will analyze the message of the video, explore cause and effect in digital communication, and reflect on their own online and offline behavior using

reading, writing, and speaking skills.

### **ELA Standards Addressed (3rd Grade)**

- RI.3.2 Determine the main idea of a text and explain how it is supported by key details.
- RI.3.3 Describe the relationship between a series of events (e.g., cause/effect).
- SL.3.1 Engage effectively in collaborative discussions.
- **W.3.1** Write opinion pieces supporting a point of view with reasons.
- L.3.4 Determine meaning of words using context clues.

# Step 1: Watch the Video - "The Rubber Band Rule"

#### **Before Watching:**

Write this on the board:

"What does it mean that something online can 'snap back' on you?" Have students jot down or share ideas.

#### After Watching - Comprehension Questions:

- What is the "Rubber Band Rule" and why is it important?
- What does Steve Trash mean when he says a post can "snap back"?
- Why is deleting a post not always enough to undo harm?
- What does being a "Media Master" mean?

**Main Idea:** Online choices are permanent and can have consequences — that's why Media Masters *THINK FIRST*.

### Step 2: Cause & Effect Sorting – Snap Back Chain

#### Activity:

Students receive "Cause" cards (online behaviors) and match them to "Effect" cards (consequences that could snap back). For example:

- Cause: Posting something embarrassing about a friend.
- **Effect**: The friend feels hurt and others lose trust in you.

Extension: Students create their own Snap Back cause/effect examples in pairs.

# **Step 3: Opinion Writing Prompt – Should We Think Before We Post?**

Prompt: "Why is it important to think before posting something online or texting someone?"

Students should:

- State an opinion clearly
- Support it with reasons (and examples from the video or real life)
- Conclude with a reminder about the Rubber Band Rule

Optional sentence starters:

"I believe we should always think before we post because..."

# **Step 4: Group Discussion – Be the Media Master!**

Divide the class into small groups. Give each group a situation to analyze. They answer: "What would a Media Master do here?" and explain why.

Example Situations:

- A classmate accidentally sends a silly picture in a group chat.
- You see someone being cyberbullied.
- You want to comment on a video, but you're upset.

Groups present their ideas to the class.

### **Step 5: Create a "Think First" Poster**

Students design a small poster to help others remember the Rubber Band Rule. Posters should include:

- A short message (e.g., "Think Before You Click!" or "Don't Let It Snap Back!")
- An illustration
- One positive tip for smart posting

Use these for a classroom display or bulletin board titled "Media Masters at Work!"

### Wrap-Up: Snaps Back or Stretchy? - Quick Fire Round

Teacher reads statements aloud. Students decide:

"SNAPS BACK!" (unwise, could cause problems)

"STRETCHY!" (kind, safe, thoughtful)

#### Examples:

- 1. "I posted a funny photo without asking my friend." → SNAPS BACK
- 2. "I commented, 'This video is awesome!'" → STRETCHY
- 3. "I wrote something when I was mad." → SNAPS BACK
- 4. "I asked myself, 'Would this hurt someone?' before I shared." → STRETCHY

# **Optional Extensions**

- **Text-to-Self Connection**: "Write about a time something you said or did came back to you later. What happened?"
- Read-Aloud Pairing: Nerdy Birdy Tweets by Aaron Reynolds (great for digital kindness discussion)
- Home Connection: Send home a "Media Master Family Pledge" to review with caregivers
