Fifth Grade ELA Study Guide

Video Title: The Rubber Band Rule

Theme: Think before you post — online actions have lasting consequences

Grade Level: 5th Grade

Time Needed: ~45–60 minutes

Goal: Students will interpret the message of the video, explore cause and effect in digital choices, and develop structured arguments and narratives about digital

responsibility.

ELA Standards Addressed (5th Grade)

- RI.5.2 Determine the main idea of a text and explain how it is supported by key details.
- RI.5.3 Explain relationships and interactions between ideas (e.g., cause/effect).
- **W.5.1** Write opinion pieces on topics or texts, supporting a point of view with reasons and information.

Step 1: Watch the Video – "The Rubber Band Rule"

Pre-Viewing Prompt (on board):

"How can what you post online affect you in the future?"

Discussion Questions After Watching:

- What is the main message Steve Trash wants us to understand?
- What examples show how online actions can "snap back"?
- How does this relate to real-life experiences you or someone you know might have had?
- What kind of person do you want to be online?

Main Idea: The things you do online — kind or unkind, public or private — can come back to affect you in the future.

Step 2: Cause & Effect Web

Activity:

Use a graphic organizer to build a web of possible outcomes from a single online action.

Prompt:

"Posting a mean comment about someone online."

Example Effects:

- That person gets upset
- Others join in or screenshot it
- A teacher or parent finds out
- Your online reputation is damaged
- You feel regret

Extension: Students create their own cause/effect webs based on different digital choices.

Step 3: Opinion Writing Prompt - Why Should You Think First Online?

Prompt:

"Do you think it's important to be careful about what you post online? Explain why or why not."

Students should:

- State an opinion clearly
- Support it with 2–3 reasons and examples
- Use transitions and precise language
- End with a strong conclusion

Encourage peer editing and revision before publishing their final copy.

Step 4: Narrative Writing – The Snap Back Story

Prompt:

Write a short fictional story about a kid who posts something without thinking... and it snaps back! Include:

- Characters and setting
- The post or action
- The chain of consequences
- What the character learns
- A resolution showing growth

This blends digital citizenship with narrative skills and empathy-building.

Step 5: Group Activity – What Would a Media Master Do?

Each group receives a realistic online dilemma. They discuss:

- 1. What's the potential "snap back"?
- 2. What would a *Media Master* do instead?
- 3. Why is the Media Master's choice better?

Example Situations:

- You see a classmate post an embarrassing video of someone.
- You're angry and want to comment on a friend's post.
- Someone sends you a link to a private photo.

Challenge: Groups act out both the "Snap Back" version and the "Media Master" version.

Step 6: Media Master PSA Posters or Videos

Project:

In small groups, create a public service announcement (poster or video) that teaches the Rubber Band Rule.

Poster must include:

A short slogan (e.g., "Click Smart, Think First!" or "Kind Posts Only!")

- A visual showing a digital choice and its consequences
- At least one tip for being a responsible digital citizen

Wrap-Up: Think First Lightning Round

Teacher reads quick online scenarios. Students hold up: SNAP BACK – Risky or unkind MEDIA MASTER – Thoughtful and kind

Example scenarios:

- Posting a joke that makes fun of someone → SNAP BACK
- Asking before tagging someone in a photo → MEDIA MASTER
- Sharing something without checking if it's true → SNAP BACK
- Pausing before replying in anger → MEDIA MASTER

Optional Extensions

- Reading Connection: Bullying in Cyberspace by Heather E. Schwartz
- **Text-to-Self Prompt**: "Describe a time when you or someone you know learned a lesson about being careful online."
- Family Extension: Send home a "Digital Footprint Reflection" worksheet to discuss with adults.

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
