Grade Level: Kindergarten

Video Title: Who's Getting the Candy?

Media Literacy Focus: Understanding post motivation on social media

Essential Question

Why do people post things on the internet? Who benefits from what we see online?

Learning Targets

Students will be able to:

- Ask "Who's getting the candy?" when looking at online content
- Understand that online posts are created for a reason
- Begin to distinguish between different motivations behind a message (money, popularity, fame, helping others)

Vocabulary

- Post something shared online like a picture, video, or message
- **Candy** a reward people get for posting (like money, fame, or popularity)
- Popular when lots of people know and like you
- Helpful doing something kind or useful for others

Whole Group Discussion

Ask students:

- 1. What kinds of things do people post online?
- 2. Do you think people get something from making those posts?
- 3. If someone posts a funny picture and lots of people laugh, what kind of "candy" do they get?

4. Can we share things just to help others too?

Teacher Tip: Use real-life examples (like sharing a favorite snack or joke) to relate to the idea of digital "candy."

Activity Idea:

Candy Sort Game

Create picture cards that show different kinds of posts:

- A funny cat picture
- A news story
- A restaurant review
- A mean comment
- A recipe
- A video game tip

Have students:

- Pick a card
- Say who might get the candy
- Decide what kind of candy it is (money, popularity, helping others)

Use a labeled "Candy Jar" chart to categorize examples together.

Writing Extension (or Drawing Prompt)

Prompt:

Draw a picture of something you would share online to help someone.

Then write (or dictate):

"This post helps people. The candy I get is _____." (happy feelings, smiles, popularity, etc.)

Reflection Question

Can a post help both you and someone else at the same time? Why do you think that's good?

Discussion about helping others and choosing to share positive posts supports responsible digital citizenship.

- Different kinds of "candy" (rewards) exist for creators
- Sharing can be helpful and positive
- Thoughtful sharing is part of being a good digital citizen

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
