A strong answer should include:

Characters who might fall for it:

Why it's suspicious:

Schools don't make decisions based on social media shares; there's no official source; sounds too good to be true.

Possible harm:

Spreads misinformation, confuses students, wastes time, causes disappointment, encourages sharing without thinking.

Stop, think, and check; look for an official announcement from the school; don't share until you know it's true.

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
